EVERGREEN TREES DESCRIPTIONS

Red Pine: Most versatile conifer for Marquette County. Will grow in sandy soils, prefers full sun.

White Pine: Grows over 35 ft. Best looking of pines when mature, grows the tallest, lives the longest. Prefers moist sandy loam soil. Should be planted in half shade to reduce insect attack.

Balsam Fir: Dark needles are 1/2 to 1 inch long, flat needles, slow growing, symmetrically pyramidal evergreen tree with soft, bright green needles and nice fragrance. Mature height is 75 feet. Make nice fragrant Christmas trees. Prefers well-drained sites in fertile soils, can handle sandier soils.

Fraser Fir: Referred to as the "Cadillac" of Christmas trees. Prefers cool, moist, well-drained soil. Will not do well in heavy, wet clay soil.

Blue Spruce: Grows over 35 ft. Most adaptable of the spruces. Prefers rich moist soil in full sun, but can handle drier, well-drained sites and some shade. Subject to severe needle fungus diseases.

Norway Spruce: Grows over 35 ft. Fastest growing spruce, prefers good soil, but can handle some variety in site. Will tolerate half shade. Subject to insect damage.

White Spruce: Moderate growing tree with bluish-green needles, and short, dense branches. A popular Christmas tree as well as an ornamental & windbreak tree. Endures drought conditions well.

White Cedar: Fan-like glossy leaves provide year-round color. Forms a wind tight barrier when used for screening or as hedging. Foliage turns bronze during autumn in the north. Prefers heavy damp areas.

DECIDUOUS TREES & SHRUBS DESCRIPTIONS

Green Ash: Grows 50-60 ft. Spread 25-30 ft. An upright spreading, fast growing tree. Plants transplant easily and are easily grown. A valuable tree for shade, farm wood lots and windbreaks. Full to partial sun. Tolerates salt and poor drainage.

White Birch: Moderate to fast growth with a mature height up to 70 ft. Bark is tighter than native white birch—doesn't peel as readily. Birch-borer resistant. Moist, well-drained soil – full sun.

Black Cherry: Grows 8-10 ft. Spreads 6-10 ft. A broad spreading shrub. Pink to white flowers followed by edible scarlet fruit in June. Foliage is a very attractive soft green.

Nanking Cherry: Grows 8-10 ft. Spreads 6-10 ft. A broad spreading shrub. Pink to white flowers followed by edible scarlet fruit in June. Foliage is a very attractive soft green. Tolerates most soil types.

Sand Cherry: Grows up to 7 ft tall with sweet edible fruit and white flowers. Widely used by wildlife. Does well in well-drained sandy soils, but will tolerate some shade.

Red Osier Dogwood: (Shrub) Grows 7-9 ft. Spread 8-12 ft. Prefers wet to medium dry soils. White flowers followed by white berries. Good for soil erosion and food and cover for wildlife.

Silky Dogwood: (Shrub) A multi-stemmed shrub that grows to 10 feet. Yellow-white flowers in June. Blue berries in fall. Very hardy. Fast growing. Full sun. Wet to well-drained soil.

Hazelnut: Small shrub often in clumps reaching 12 ft. in height. Edible brown nuts. Grows best in moist, well drained soils but will adapt to most types of soils. Full sun or deep shade. Attracts wildlife such as deer, grouse, turkeys, pheasants & quail.

Common Lilac: Grows 12-15 ft. Spreads 10-12 ft. Delicate fragrant purple flowers in May. A perfect informal hedge or screen. Suckers freely.

Red Maple: Grows 80-100 ft. Medium to fast growing tree. Small red flowers in early spring. This is the "Acer Rubrum" species that produces brilliant red fall foliage. Tolerates most soil types. Exceptional shade and ornamental wildlife habitat.

Silver Maple: Grows to 60 ft. Very hardy, easy to grow tree, and will tolerate a wide variety of soils. One of the best trees to grow where few others will survive.

Burr Oak: Height 70-80 ft. Tolerates a variety of soil conditions. Leaf color is dark green in summer and yellow to yellowish brown in fall.

Red Oak: A wide massive 80-90 ft shade tree. The faster growing of the oaks is a versatile tree that is long lived. Tolerant of most soil types. Produces acorns, a great attractant to deer and other wildlife. Susceptible to oak wilt disease.

Swamp White Oak: Grows 50-60 ft. Does well in moist to wet soils. Shiny dark green leaves that provide yellow to purple fall color. Produces sweet acorns that are great for wildlife.

Hybrid Poplar: Grows approximately 50 ft. Spreads 30 ft. A fast growing tree with large leaves giving lots of shade in a hurry. Soil adaptable.

Serviceberry: Grows 9-10 feet tall and 4-6 feet wide. Upright growth habit with white flowers followed by blue to black edible fruit. Full sun to partial shade. A native species good for wildlife.

Tamarack: Grows 50-75 ft. Does well in wet, poorly drained areas. In the summer it has short, soft needles and tiny cones. It is an unusual conifer tree that loses its needles in the winter.
